**Why did you choose this host institution? What key factors or issues influenced your decision?**

I chose FAMU because I wanted to visit central Europe as well as be in the environment of a film school.

**Please share a few of your most positive experiences and a few of the biggest challenges you faced.**

After a week of classes, I switched programs from the International Erasmus film program to a Czech only program that specialized in new media art. The head of the department was from Montreal and knew of OCADs name in the North American art world so he brought me into the program (without having to pay.) It became challenging to work alongside other media artists that don't speak the same language as me. It was also challenging being on your own, academically...there were never set deadlines for anything, you were just to work on your own projects and present them at the end of the year (they had a show for my work.)

### 2. PREPARATION

**Please describe your preparation for the exchange, including banking, travel documents and student visa application. In retrospect, would you have done anything differently?**

You have to apply for your visa right away. FAMU has to send you your official letter of acceptance... make sure you email them about this as soon as you are accepted. You will also have to get a handful of papers signed and such, just stay organized. I got a youth mobility visa, it was valid for 5 months I believe. The most difficult part was my visa application requested a

letter from my bank, in Czech. And it couldn't be google translated, so I had to find a Czech person to translate, while I was still in Canada and didn't know anyone.

**Are there any important items (e.g. art & design supplies, documents, specialty foods, health items) that a student should take to your host country?**

If you have a special diet it's a good idea to bring speciality foods. You will be able to find speciality food shops here but EVERYTHING is in Czech. So it's hard to find out what's in products. Also, if you're a film student at FAMU you cannot rent any equipment, (as an art student I had access to it though) so bring all necessary filming equipment.

### **3. ARRIVAL**

**Was anyone at the airport, train station, etc. to meet you? Did you experience any difficulties upon arrival?**

I taxied to my apartment, my landlord was in Texas but her brother met me at the flat. I had to wait for him outside for about an hour and he only gave me the keys and I was left to figure out everything. The internet didn't work for the first week and I had no idea how to get anywhere, but it's pretty easy to figure things out. I've still never met my landlord haha.

**When should students plan to arrive at the host university? When did you arrive? Would you have benefited from arriving earlier?**

I arrived two weeks before classes started and it was ideal for me. Arrive earlier if you want to travel.

**Was there an orientation session offered at your host university? If yes, did you attend and what did you learn?**

Yes, we had orientation of Erasmus students on the first day of school. The dean and head of International students told us how to apply for our metropass, how to sign up for classes, how to get an isic card, where the schools canteen is, etc. It was helpful.

**Is there a coordinating office for international students, including exchange students, at your host university? Is there a staff person you would recommend students approach with their questions?**

Jitka Hejtmanova is in charge of international students. She is really helpful.

### **4. ACCOMMODATION**

**Where did you live during your exchange? Were you happy with your accommodation?**

I got a place off AIRBNB. It was really hard to find a place without actually being here. I can offer you a list of websites to check. You should start looking 2 months before. I was happy with my flat. It was 20 mins away from school, in Prague 10. It was really small, but I was living alone so it was fine.

**Did you have any difficulties arranging accommodation yourself? Did the host institution assist you in finding accommodation?**

The host institution will send you links for student residencies but I preferred living in a flat than a shared student space.

**Level of academic difficulty and challenge:** 6/10

**Time spent in class (# of hours per week):** 20 or so hours a week

There is a weekend away called Cinema Dance, where you go up to the country for 3 days and make a film. We have to recite a pledge that we will never talk about what happens inside of Cinema Dance. There is also a cultural topography class that shows you a lot. I went up to the Czech countryside with my class for 3 days to have an intensive critique workshop.

**What were the library and computer facilities like?**

Non existent really, better off working at a café.

**How did you prepare yourself financially for your exchange? Did you pay for the experience entirely out of your own savings? Did you receive student or bank loans? Did you have help from parents / family / friends?** I had help from my parents for my flights and then I paid for my own living/expenses on my own.

**In general, was the cost of living in your host country higher, lower, or similar to that in Canada? Please explain.** Much lower than Canada. Food, drinks are much much cheaper. Living is still pretty expensive for a one bedroom flat.

You will mostly become friends with other international students. There may be events and stuff for Erasmus students, go to meet people.

My passport got water damaged and I had to apply for another one. You have to keep your passport on you at all times in case the foreign police ask to see it. Get a passport protecting case. I was also at the Brussels airport during the attacks, and got held in Brussels for two days. It was really scary and unforeseen.
