Planning for Meaningful Work

Take some time to reflect on how you want to apply your creativity as a working professional. Actively planning through **self-reflection** and **career exploration** will lay the foundation for meaningful work that allows you to remain creative, keeps you engaged and satisfies your lifestyle.



SELF REFLECTION

What does a fulfilling career look like to you, personally? Take some time to reflect on the questions to align your individual priorities with short-term and long-term career goals:

- What are your values and skills? Values reflect what is most important to you; they drive your thoughts and actions. Skills are your strengths and competencies.
- To what extent do you want to make your creative practice your professional focus? You may choose to make an income from your creative pursuits, or make an income to support your creative pursuits.
- Are you interested in working primarily within arts or design organizations, or are you interested in exploring creative opportunities in other industries?
- What environment do you work best in?
 Consider values alignment, exposure to
 other creatives, room to grow, remote work,
 flexible schedule, etc.
- What lifestyle do you want to sustain?
 Consider location, salary ranges, job security, and benefits alongside your living expenses, wellness needs, and long-term life goals.



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Now that you have reflected on your priorities, connect your answers the job market by evaluating potential careers. Start by creating a list of occupations that match your skills, then research the roles to see how well they align with your self-reflection results. Remember to remain open and explore related types of work. Consult online career exploration tools and search job boards using keywords that match your skills and areas of practice.

- Conduct informational interviews with people working in roles and industries of interest. Start with alumni from your program.
- Take a related course in your field of interest to develop required skills.
- Participate in an internship, summer or parttime job, or freelance while you're a student. You will gain first-hand experience and these entry-level roles will become the gateway to your wider creative community.

DEVELOP AN ACTION PLAN

After gathering this information, identify one or more early-stage goals and a timeline. This action plan may focus on your job search, informational interviews, additional training/certification, gaining experience, and

developing your application materials. You action plan will ideally provide you with a basis for identifying and pursuing longer-term, more substantial roles.



You don't have to accomplish everything on your action plan all at once! Take it slowly and do small things that will make you feel productive such as committing to just 1 hour of career exploration a week, or conducting 1 information interview a month.


