

Your Program Requirements

This program guide defines the 20.0 credits required for the Bachelor of Fine Arts (BFA) in Drawing & Painting, including Major requirements (specific courses and course options), Arts & Science requirements and open electives.

Of the 20.0 credits required, the following applies:

- No more than 6.0 credits may be at the 1000 level
- At least 5.0 credits must be at the 3000 level or higher, including at least 1.0 credit at the 4000 level or higher
- At least 1.5 credits of Arts & Science courses must be at the 3000 or 4000 level

Reading Your Program Guide

Course Codes

Codes begin with a four letter subject code followed by four digits. The first digit indicates the year level of the course. For example, *GRPH-2004* designates a specific *Graphic Design* course at the *2000 level*. Generally, students complete 1000 and 2000 level courses before 3000 and 4000 level courses.

Course Weight

- 0.5 credit courses typically meet three hours per week for a 12-week term.
- 1.0 credit courses typically meet six hours per week for a 12-week term.

Major Requirements - Course Options

Although a specific number of credits are required from each category, you may choose to take additional courses from these lists as open electives.

Sample 4 Year Plan & Helpful Planning Information (at the end of this package)

The program is structured so that it can be completed in four years, by a student taking 2.5 credits per term in the fall and winter terms (a limited number of courses are also offered in the spring/summer terms). The sample plan will help you plan your courses.

In addition to general planning tips and suggested pathways, the helpful planning information can include recommended courses for your program and tips on meeting prerequisites for electives you may want to take.

An **open elective** may be chosen from any of the following subject areas: ADVR, ASOC, BUSI, CRCP, CROS, CRWR, DIGF, DRPT, ENVR, ENGL, EXAN, FABR, GART, GDES, GRPH, HUMN, ILLU, INDS, INTM, INVC, IVCA, IVCD, IVCL, IVCV, LIFE, MAAD, PHOT, PRNT, PRPB, SCIN, SCTM, SOSC, VISA, VISC, VISD, VISM.

Senior undergraduate students in good academic standing may take graduate courses at the **5000 level** from any of the following subject areas: CADN, CRCP, DHEA, DIGF, INCD, SFIN. Inquiries regarding access to 5000 level courses should be directed to the student's Faculty Office.

Students who have completed a minimum of 4.0 credits and are in good academic standing may **declare a minor**. Only open electives and general Arts & Science courses may fulfill both degree and minor requirements, subject to the credit limits stipulated in this program guide. Helpful Planning Information – Drawing & Painting

General Planning Tips:

- Open Electives can be fulfilled from across programs, allowing you to explore electives in other disciplines, as well as take additional Drawing & Painting courses to address your interests.
- When choosing Open Electives, we recommend you consider the courses in the Course Options categories as these courses are a good fit with your Major. If you take more courses than the minimum requirement to fulfill the Course Options category, these courses will fulfill Open Electives.
- In your third and fourth years of study, the experiential learning course options (**Category D**) provide opportunities for making connections and gaining professional experience, which assist in and can lead to future employment prospects.
 - A field placement provides hands-on experience in an area of interest with an artist, gallery, arts admin organization or other setting of your choice. This requires personal initiative in approaching the organization of your choice for a placement, while the *Centre for Emerging Artists and Designers* provides assistance and advice.
 - The CROS-3001 *Professional Practice* course provides information about the practicalities of an art career.
 - The CROS-3023/CROS-3024 *Learning in the Field I/II* and CROS-3027 *Art & Design Education Lab* courses offer more support and structure while providing internship placements.

Planning for Fourth/Final Year:

- For your final year you have three options to culminate your degree:
 - **Option 1:** DRPT-4901 *Thesis: Studio Research* (1.0 credit) and DRPT-4902 *Thesis: Presentation* (1.0 credit). In this version of the program, you will spend the year preparing your studio research and developing a project/body of work for your culminating graduation exhibition.
 - **Option 2:** CROS-4901 *Open Studio Thesis: Research* (1.0 credit) and CROS-4902 *Open Studio Thesis: Presentation* (1.0 credit). In these courses you will be grouped with an interdisciplinary cohort from across the Faculty of Art, preparing your studio research and developing a project/body of work for your graduation exhibition.
 - **Option 3:** You will choose any 2.0 credits of 3000 and/or 4000 level DRPT courses, in your area of interest, in order to culminate your degree and produce artworks for your graduation exhibition.
- If you intend to pursue a Master's program, you should consider undertaking thesis courses, as they build skills that can help prepare students for graduate programs.

- If you intend to pursue Art Teaching as a profession upon graduation, you are encouraged to take electives such as CROS-3027 *Art & Design Education Lab*, CROS-4007 *Art & Design Ed: Community*, CROS-3001 *Professional Practice*, and consider a field placement with an arts education institution.
- If you intend to pursue a career in arts administration, museum or gallery work, consider taking electives from the Criticism & Curatorial Practice program, such as CRCP-2002 *Museums, Galleries, Alternates*, CRCP-2004 *Criticism Practice*, CRCP-3005 *Cultural Agents*.
