



I am pleased to share with you Onsite Gallery's report for the 2024-2025 fiscal year. This past year has been one of vibrant artistic exploration, meaningful engagement, and growing impact—made possible by your generous support.

Throughout the year, we presented a compelling series of exhibitions and projects, each accompanied by free and accessible public programs, workshops, and lectures. These initiatives engaged both the OCAD University community and a broader public audience, advancing our mission to foster inclusive, thought-provoking cultural experiences.

We continued to extend our presence in the public realm through our successful collaboration with the Inuit Art Foundation on *Up Front: Inuit Public Art* @ *Onsite Gallery.* Since its launch in April 2022, this exterior digital mural series has featured nine exceptional Inuit artists. This fiscal year marked the final phase of the series, with works by Maureen Gruben and Coco Lynge. At the main campus, Jordan Bennett's striking mural, *pi'tawita'iek: we go up river*, remained on view in its third year, and still commands attention from its prominent location overlooking Butterfield Park.

In Fall 2024, Onsite Gallery presented *The Metispo Portal* for the City of Toronto's Nuit Blanche, drawing an overwhelming number of visitors and further affirming our relevance in the city's public cultural landscape. Our work this year was also recognized with nominations from Galeries Ontario Galleries (GOG Awards), earning awards for Partnership (*Up Front*) and Short Essay (*On Americanity and Other Belongings*).

The exhibition year began with the OCAD University faculty and staff exhibition other tongues part I communication, running through the fall semester alongside Jean Marshall's solo presentation in the Special Projects Gallery, part of guest curator Linda Grussani's Mawadishiwewin series. In January 2025, we opened Fortitude / Fragile, a compelling group exhibition curated by Magda González-Mora. We also proudly launched the inaugural The Delaney Family Curator's Prize in the Special Projects Gallery with Presence in a past or an undetermined future, curated by Avalon Mott and featuring artists Nabil Azab and Shannon Garden Smith.

In the winter, Onsite Gallery hosted its second annual Curatorial Lecture in celebration of Black History Month and continued stewarding the OCAD University Art Collection with care and commitment.

Through all of our exhibitions and programs, Onsite Gallery remains dedicated to presenting contemporary, Indigenous, and public art and design practices that foster knowledge creation and provoke vital conversations on the pressing issues of our time.

None of this would be possible without the support from The Delaney Family's visionary decade-long gift, along with generous individual and corporate contributions including Tim Gilbert, Nexus and others, These generous gifts allow us to continue nurturing diverse artistic voices, producing thoughtful and timely exhibitions, and building Onsite Gallery's reputation as a site of knowledge and a vital cultural institution for all.

On behalf of our entire team, thank you for your continued belief in our mission. I hope you enjoy this year's report, and I look forward to welcoming you to Onsite Gallery soon.















## SEPTEMBER 2023 TO DECEMBER 2024

In Dance me through the herd, caribou hooves sit on candle ice. These scaled up forms have been printed using 3D scans of hooves harvested in the Inuvialuit Settlement Region, which Gruben cleaned and scraped by hand. Candle ice forms towards the end of spring as the sea ice melts into columns; the pieces chime as they continuously break off and drift against one another.

Caribou hooves hold scent glands through which herds leave messages for one another as they migrate across the tundra and beaches of the Western Arctic. The arrangements here are reminiscent of shelters, spaces for meeting to share stories and knowledge. They speak to ancient patterns of gathering as we move through our environment while it shifts around us.

The mural *Maliina* (2024) beautifully weaves together different, yet impactful versions of the Inuit circumpolar origin story of the sun and the moon. All versions share the same pivotal moment whereby Maliina rubs soot on her hands, and in the morning light, discovers the shocking truth / evidence—that the one she had shared the night with was her brother, the moon. This revelation sparks an eternal chase across the sky, with sun and moon pursuing each other endlessly, shaping day and night.

Presented as a unique, large-scale, outdoor installation on the façade of Onsite Gallery, Rosalie Favell's TSÍ TKARÒN:TO comprises a suite of photographs selected from the Ottawabased Red River Metis artist's renowned portrait series Facing the Camera, a monumental national and international visual archive documenting the broad diversity of Indigenous arts and cultural communities.

Facing the Camera: TSÍ TKARÒN:TO is presented in conjunction with Onsite Gallery's touring exhibition Rosalie Favell | Belonging (1982–2024) and is a 2025 Core Program with the CONTACT Photography Festival.



Each exhibition was complemented by a fulsome schedule of free public programming designed to activate the exhibition's curatorial premise, related topics and advance diversity priorities. Our achievements respond to systemic deficits in the sector, and we welcomed greater representation and diversity in our approach with all activities.

A project grant received from Canada Council for the Arts produced the exhibition *Fortitude / Fragile.* 

The Delaney Family Curator's Prize supported the exhibition *Presence in a past or an* undetermined future.

An Ontario Arts Council grant supported *Mawadishiwewin* series (Jean Marshall and Linda Grussani). *Up Front: Inuit Public Art @ Onsite Gallery* was supported by an Inuit Art Foundation partnership and grants from the City of Toronto and Toronto Friends of the Visual Arts.

We continue to receive operating grants from the Toronto Arts Council and Ontario Arts Council.


We also partnered with Native Women in the Arts who generously sponsored a program for the *Mawadishiwewin* series.





DURATIONAL PERFORMANCE WITH NATALIE WALDBURGER

The event showcased the mesmerizing world of tessellated origami, where geometry and art collided in a dance of precision and beauty during a 4-hour durational performance with Natalie Waldburger. Tessellation, the seamless coverage of an infinite plane with a repeatable pattern without gaps or overlaps, formed the foundation of her work.

Natalie transformed single sheets of paper into stunning arrays of repeated folds, creating large-scale origami tessellation sculptures that documented the intricate and physically demanding folding process.

Each piece emphasized the tension between the paper's structural rigidity and its ephemeral nature. The performance, featuring a larger-than-life image of the artist, highlighted the collision between abstract geometric forms and the tangible reality of the material, capturing the ever-present potential for failure.

Audiences experienced the captivating artistry and deep narratives embedded in Waldburger's sculptures, immersing themselves in their beauty and thought-provoking themes.

Presented in the Special Projects Gallery, the exhibition invited visitors to experience the works firsthand and remained on view through November 30, 2024.

Nuit Blanche 2024: The Metipso Portal

Co-presented *The Metipso Portal International*, this 12-hour live and interactive Nuit Blanche 2024 – *Bridging Distance* event was a collaboration between OCAD U's Onsite Gallery and The Metipso Portal International. The multi-faceted exhibition linked Toronto to The Metipso Portal International Mud Hut Media Lab for the *Live Broadcast Experiment:* #NB-OCAD-10-05-24. The Metipso Portal International, the world's only experimental media lab operating in a traditional mud hut in a village on the edge of a protected forest in the highlands of Central Kenya, delivered its most ambitious presentation to date. Artwork presented throughout the night included a compilation of archival footage, played on the central screen, showcasing past connections between the Metipso Portal and people worldwide.

To the side of the screen, through a live Zoom call, over 4,000 Toronto participants met and interacted with a member from Metipso village (Kenya). This intimate call ran for the full 12 hours.

Hosted by an array of the ActionCan Films who, including Benjamin Blais, John Fleming and newcomer Arleigh Curran from Toronto along with Metipso TV team in Kenya, including Teddy Purity, KAIDA, Javan Batenga and renowned international presenter Topi Lyambila.

Visitors experienced live interactions between the bicontinental hosts, audience members, fun games as well as talented performances from both sides including Cellist Margaret Maria, Traditional Village Singers and Cocanina.

This unique exhibit has been orchestrated by lead Canadian artists Joel Richardson and Susan de Freitas and Kenyan Olympic Gold medallist Matthew Birir.








## **OCTOBER 19TH, 2024**






## **NOVEMBER 6TH, 2024**

Titled Handle with Care: Curatorial Practices
After the Pandemic, the lecture explored
critical questions: What did it mean to curate
with care in a world facing conflicts, wars,
and genocide? Who and what did curatorial
practices care for?

In her talk, eunice bélidor shared strategies employed by curators, including herself, such as archiving and radical hospitality, to create meaningful and relevant exhibitions that nurtured all participants—curators, artists, and audiences alike. Following the lecture, Joséphine Denis joined eunice for a conversation and moderated a Q&A with the audience.



Through engaging, hands-on activities, participants learned essential techniques for painting with natural materials, including crafting botanical inks and dyes, preparing solvent-free oil paint from mineral pigments, creating textural effects, and understanding the science behind these processes to achieve captivating, long-lasting results.



**DYKE NIGHT** Fortitude/Fragile


